HISTORY & FACILITIES

Since our inception in 2002, **Pura Vida Adventures, Inc.** has served the Palm Beach area recreational diving community with quality dive instruction, retail dive equipment, and world-class dive charters. **Pura Vida Divers, LLC** was created to work hand in hand with **Pura Vida Adventures**, offering the highest quality Instructor Development Training in the Palm Beaches and South Florida. Utilizing our spacious classrooms, retail facility and office complex, **Pura Vida Divers, LLC** is dedicated to providing you with the finest instructor training.

Our School is located on Singer Island, the barrier island just north of Palm Beach, in Florida's Palm Beach County. Because the rich currents of the Gulf Stream come closest to Florida right here in Palm Beach County bringing amazing schools of fish and large animals, we firmly believe this area hosts the best diving in Florida!

Since the most important aspect of diver training takes place in the open water, **Pura Vida Divers, LLC** is fortunate to be located one block from the warm, clear waters of the Atlantic Ocean. All of your open water training is conducted in these pristine dive conditions from either the shore or from the dive boat. Confined water activities are conducted either in a nearby pool or in confined open water from the shore.

Our facility has two classrooms, a small classroom (18.5 ft. x 10.5 ft.) for private sessions, and a larger classroom (19.5 ft. x 18.5 ft.) for group training. We also provide high speed wireless internet at the school and a computer that is available for students to access their personal email. Our Administrative Offices are on-site.

Pura Vida Divers, LLC is licensed to conduct Scuba Instructor Training by the Commission for Independent Education, in the State of Florida, and by PADI Americas.

COURSE DIRECTOR

Our Course Director, Barbara DeClerque has trained divers since 1984 and PADI Instructors since 1995. She has an extensive background in recreational scuba diving and many years of experience teaching recreational and professional dive courses.

Barbara previously conducted Instructor Training in Florida, the Bahamas and the US and British Virgin Islands. Realizing the need for quality professional level training in the Palm Beach area, Barbara was instrumental in the formation of our Instructor Development Center.

ADMINISTRATIVE INFORMATION

PERFORMANCE REQUIREMENTS AND GRADING

Skills, Academics, Confined and Open Water presentations will be graded as follows:

5, Excellent; 4, Good; 3, Average; 2 Below Average; 1, Unacceptable.

For PADI Courses: The passing grade on all written tests is 75% or higher. Anything below 75% would be considered failing. PADI Courses are performance based and students will be expected to repeat assignments until acceptable grades are achieved. In order to attain certification at any level, students must demonstrate mastery of all performance requirements specified for a particular course.

Candidates are also required to score at least 3.5 or higher on at least two academic presentations and 3.4 or higher on one open water presentation and two confined open water presentations during the IDC. Upon successful completion of the IDC, students will receive an IDC School Diploma called a "Certificate of Completion" from **Pura Vida Divers**. This Diploma qualifies the Student to attend an Instructor Exam. In the unlikely event a student cannot achieve acceptable grades, they will have the opportunity to repeat all or part of the course in the next program offered.

COUNSELING

Students receive continual input and critique on their performance during the courses. Candidates receive private counseling sessions throughout the IDC. These sessions are conducted by the Course Director and are designed to discover any concerns that a student may have whether academic or procedural.

STUDENT CONCERNS AND GRIEVANCES

Our Professional Training programs follow strict academic standards set forth by PADI. Students will be given several opportunities to meet these standards and obtain the required scores. In the unusual event that a student is unable to complete the course in the set time provided, they will be unable to attend the next course scheduled including the Instructor Exam; however, they will have the opportunity to repeat all or part of the course in the next program offered. Any academic complaints should be directed to the Course Director. Any administrative complaints should be directed to the President. The issues will be reviewed and a response given within 24 hours. If the student is not satisfied with the results after exhausting the institutions policy, the student may contact the Commission for Independent Education using the contact information found on the cover of this catalog.

ATTENDANCE POLICY

Professional SCUBA training is by nature very condensed. For this reason, unexcused absences will not be allowed and will be considered grounds for dismissal. Absences due to illness or emergencies must be approved by the Course Director. All training missed due to excused absences must be completed prior to the issuance of any certificate. The student will be charged at a rate of \$40 per contact hour (above and beyond the regular tuition) for all such makeup work if the makeup is conducted in special sessions rather than in subsequent classes. Tardiness will be considered a serious breach of rules. Therefore, lateness on more than two occasions will result in a formal warning; lateness on the third occasion will result in dismissal. Students dismissed or failing to meet certification requirements due to unsatisfactory performance will be required to repeat the appropriate course in its entirety. If extended absences result in failure to complete certification requirements in the allotted time, provisions for completion may be made with the Course Director.

CONDUCT

All students are expected to conduct themselves in a professional manner at all times. Students will be subject to immediate dismissal for the following:

1. Possession or consumption of alcohol or narcotics during training.
2. Abusiveness towards other students or staff.
3. Violations of local, state or federal laws.
4. Damage to school premises or property or theft.
5. Gross violation of safe diving practices.

ACADEMIC AND DISCIPLINARY ACTIONS

If a student believes their academic scores are incorrect they can request an evaluation by another staff member. However, due to PADI's strict standards, the Course Director and IDC Staff members have the final say in students' scores. In the unlikely event that a student violates one or more of the actions listed under "CONDUCT" they are subject to dismissal from the school. If they believe they have been judged erroneously they are entitled to a counseling session with the President and the Course Director. The President will have the final say in these matters. Any violations of local, state or federal laws will be reported to the authorities.

HOUSING

PLACEMENT ASSISTANCE

Placement assistance is offered to students who successfully complete the IDC and IE. While we will make every effort to find employment for our graduates, we cannot guarantee employment.

STUDENT RECORDS

Student records will be kept indefinitely. Student will have access to these records upon request.

POLICY STATEMENT

The school does not discriminate on the basis of race, sex or age. We will attempt to accommodate students with disabilities; however, a student must demonstrate the required performance requirements and provide a completed Medical Statement Form (signed by a physician). All applicants to **Pura Vida Divers, LLC** professional level training programs must be at least 18 years of age by the starting date of the course.

DEPOSITS AND TUITION

Deposits are required to hold a space in a course. The deposit must accompany a signed "Enrollment Agreement". Once accepted your deposit will be applied to the program applied for. The balance of tuition is required prior to attending the first class. The school does not offer financial aid.

METHOD OF PAYMENT

Acceptable forms of payment include: Travelers checks, MC, Visa, AMEX, Discover, money orders or cash. *Personal checks will be accepted for course deposits only if received a minimum of two weeks before the class start date.* The DEPOSIT is due at the time of signing the Enrollment Agreement and the BALANCE OF TUITION is required prior to attending the first class. All funds are payable in U.S. dollars.

REQUIRED GEAR

Required Equipment: Fins, mask, snorkel, buoyancy control device (BCD) with tank mount or separate backpack and low pressure inflator, primary regulator and alternate air source, submersible pressure gauge, depth gauge, quick release weight system and weights, wetsuit, whistle, dive computer, RDP (eRDPml or Table), delayed surface marker buoy (DSMB), time monitoring device, compass, dive knife/cutting tool, underwater camera. Candidates may come arrive with required gear, purchase required gear from **Pura Vida Divers**, or rent required gear from **Pura Vida Divers** for an additional fee.

REFUND POLICY

Should a Student/applicant cancel his/her enrollment or be terminated by the School for any reason, all refunds will be made according to the following schedule:

1. Cancellation can be made in person, by electronic mail, by Certified Mail or by termination.
2. All monies will be refunded if the School does not accept the applicant or if the Student cancels within three (3) business days after signing the enrollment agreement and making initial payment. An applicant not requesting cancellation by the scheduled starting date will be considered a Student.
3. Cancellation after the third (3rd) business day, but before the first class, will result in a refund of all monies paid, with the exception of the deposit (not to exceed \$150.00) and any eLearning fees if applicable. The cost of any books purchased from **Pura Vida Divers** that the student may wish to return will be refunded providing they are unopened and can be resold as new. The books must be returned within three (3) days of signing the Enrollment Agreement in order to receive a full refund. **FAST TRACK Students Only:** please be aware that once you are issued the equipment included with this program it cannot be returned. If you leave the program for any reason you will be financially responsible for the issued equipment at the cost of \$7,000.00.
4. Students voluntarily terminating and/or those dismissed by the School will receive a refund pro-rated on an hourly basis. However, there will be no refunds issued once more than 40% of the program is completed.
5. Termination Date: When calculating the refund due to the Student, the last date of actual attendance by the Student is used in the calculation unless earlier written notice was received.
6. Refunds will be made within 30 days of termination of the Student's enrollment or receipt of a Cancellation Notice from the Student.

CREDIT FOR PRIOR TRAINING

Credit for prior training will be assessed by the Course Director on an individual basis and granted if appropriate. Prior training is defined as successful completion of PADI courses within one year and verified by a PADI Course Director in current teaching status. Credits are defined in terms of hours and there is a max amount of 25% transferable. If a candidate produces verifiable prior training, it can be applied.

TRANSFER OF CREDIT

Credit for prior training may only be transferred at the discretion of the accepting institution. It is the student's responsibility to check to see if prior training credit will be accepted by another institution. Definition of a unit of credit is as follows: "clock hour" means a period of 60 minutes with a minimum of 50 minutes of instruction in the presence of an instructor.

PURA VIDA DIVERS PROFESSIONAL PROGRAMS:

FAST TRACK 258.0 Clock Hours

Pura Vida Divers Fast Track Program takes a non-diver from Open Water through PADI Divemaster keeping in mind PADI's requirements for time and number of dives. This program can be entered with no certification or experience.

Objective: The objective of the Fast Track Program is to take the non-diver and assist them on their path to becoming a PADI dive professional able to work in the scuba industry.

Entrance/Admission Requirements: 18 years old, PADI Diving Medical examination form signed by a physician (specifically an MD or DO) stating fitness to dive and dated within the previous 12 months.

DIVE PROFESSIONAL CAREER LEVEL 1: DIVEMASTER 144.0 Clock Hours

The Dive Professional Career Level 1: Divemaster Program is the first Level of **Pura Vida Divers** Career Development Programs. The program encompasses all courses required to enter a PADI Instructor Development Course (IDC), plus highly recommended career enhancement courses. This Level can be entered at any point once meeting the entry requirements. Advanced Open Water Certification is required.

Objective: The objective of **Pura Vida Divers** Dive Professional Career Level 1: Divemaster Program is to take the experienced recreational diver and elevate their certifications and diving skills to the professional level which culminates with a PADI Divemaster certification. This program prepares candidates to take the next step, which is Dive Professional Career Level 2: Open Water Scuba Instructor.

Entrance/Admission Requirements: 18 years old, PADI Advanced Open Water Diver or PADI recognized equivalent and completed PADI EFR Primary and Secondary Care training within the last 24 months or PADI recognized equivalent. 40 dives are required at minimum to start the Rescue and Divemaster components, 60 dives are required before you can be certified as a Divemaster (must also have certifications in Deep, Search & Recovery), completion of Knowledge Reviews for Enriched Air, Diving Accident Insurance (DAN is recommended), PADI Diving Medical Examination form signed by a physician (specifically an MD or a DO) stating fitness to dive and dated within the previous 12 months.

DIVE PROFESSIONAL CAREER LEVEL 2: OPEN WATER SCUBA INSTRUCTOR 91.0 Clock Hours

Pura Vida Divers Dive Professional Career Level 2 is the Open Water Scuba Instructor course. This program begins with the PADI Instructor Development Course (IDC). This level also includes EFR/CFC Instructor and the PADI Instructor Examination.

Additionally, we offer optional Instructor Exam Theory Preparation Workshops available for those who would like additional instruction. This Career Level can be entered at any point provided the student meets the entry requirements. After successful completion of the PADI Instructor Exam (IE), PADI will award the candidate its Open Water Scuba Instructor certification.

Objective: The objective of **Pura Vida Divers** Dive Professional Career Level 2: Open Water Scuba Instructor is to take a certified Divemaster and elevate their certifications and diving skills to the PADI Instructor level. This program puts these candidates on a direct path to working in the diving industry as an Instructor.

Entrance/Admission Requirements: 18 years old, certified as PADI Advanced Open Water Diver, PADI Rescue Diver and PADI Divemaster or PADI recognized equivalents and completed PADI EFR Primary and Secondary Care training within the last 24 months or PADI recognized equivalent. Be a certified Open Water Diver for at least 6 months. Have a PADI Diving Medical Statement signed by a physician (MO or DO) and dated within the previous 12 months. Proof of 100 logged dives and showing experience in Deep, Night and Navigation. Have Diving Accident Insurance (Divers Alert Network Insurance is recommended)

DIVE PROFESSIONAL CAREER LEVEL 3: RESORT OPERATIONS 182.5 Clock Hours

Pura Vida Divers Dive Professional Career Level 3 consists of DAN Diving First Aid for Professional Divers Instructor (includes 6 DAN Instructor and 4 Provider certifications), PADI Master Scuba Diver Trainer Prep (includes 5 PADI Specialty Instructor certifications), and Resort Operations (an additional 6 Instructor ratings and 8 certifications. At the conclusion of this program the student will meet the qualifications to apply for MSDT once PADI's requirements are met.

Objective: **Pura Vida Divers** Dive Professional Career Level 3: Resort Operations program was developed to help PADI Instructors become successful in their scuba careers by providing additional necessary training sought after by potential employers. This program offers our students one of the most comprehensive continuing education programs in the industry.

Entrance/Admissions Requirements: 18 years of age; DAN Membership, Active Status Open Water Scuba Instructor with CPR & First Aid Instructor ratings. Current CPR Instructor, documentation of current First Aid training (Instructor level recommended), must be a renewed PADI Instructor or completed an IDC or OWSI course within the last 12 months. Certified as a PADI Enriched Air (Nitrox) diver or hold a qualifying certified training within the last 24 months.

**DOP-102:
DAN Emergency Oxygen for Scuba Diving Injuries Provider
6.0 Clock Hours**

The DAN (Divers Alert Network) Oxygen Provider course is a basic training course in providing oxygen first aid to injured divers of diving related accidents. This training is a prerequisite for the PADI/DAN Oxygen Instructor and Career Level 3 programs. When combined with the PADI Rescue Diver and EFR courses, students receive the best possible preparation to react to any diving rescue incident. This course is considered highly desirable by most dive operators.

DM-201: PADI Divemaster

86.0 Clock Hours

The PADI Divemaster course is a twelve-day course during which qualified Rescue Divers learn the knowledge and skills necessary to make the transition from a recreational diver to the first professional membership level of PADI.

Professional level academic knowledge is developed and tested.

Confined water training includes: improving all standard open water skills to demonstration quality; Rescue skills; equipment exchange (problem solving); watermanship and stamina. Dives typically include: deep, wreck, drift, reef, navigation, underwater mapping. Dive leader exercises develop the candidates' skills in dive planning, leadership and proper response to common underwater problems. Functioning as an instructional assistant is also covered in the pool and open water. Upon successful completion of the course, the student is certified as a PADI Divemaster and qualifies for attendance in the PADI Instructor Development Course (IDC).

Prerequisites: Certified as a PADI Advanced Open Water Diver and PADI Rescue Diver or equivalent. Completed PADI EFR Primary and Secondary Care training within the last 24 months or PADI recognized equivalent. 40 dives are required to start the Divemaster program but 60 dives are required before the Divemaster candidate can be certified (this must also include Deep Underwater Navigation, and Night diving experience). Diving accident insurance (DAN is recommended). PADI Diving Medical Examination Form signed by a physician (specifically an MD or a DO) stating fitness to dive and dated within the previous 12 months.

IDC-201: PADI Instructor Development Course

This nine-day course trains eligible students to qualify for and successfully pass the PADI Instructor exam in order to obtain a PADI Open Water Scuba Instructor Certification. In order to become a **PADI Open Water Instructor** a qualified student must successfully complete the **Instructor Development Course (IDC)** and then attend and pass the **PADI Instructor Exam (IE)**. The IDC can be entered at any level provided you meet the entry requirements. After successful completion of the PADI Instructor Examination (IE), PADI will award candidates its Open Water Scuba Instructor certification.

The complete PADI Instructor Development Course is designed to prepare qualified candidates to become PADI Instructors. The IDC is divided into two segments. The first is the Assistant Instructor (AI) course and the second is the Open Water Scuba Instructor (OWSI) course. Together the two courses encompass the entire IDC. Both courses must be completed before attending the PADI Instructor Exam (IE). Each segment can be scheduled as a stand-alone course or completed all at one time.

PADI INSTRUCTOR EXAMINATION IE

The PADI Instructor Examination (IE) is scheduled on Saturday and Sunday in Fort Lauderdale, or Vero Beach (check scheduling by contacting **Pura Vida Divers**) immediately following **Pura Vida Divers** IDC. The IE is a standardized, objective evaluation conducted by Instructor Examiners from PADI Headquarters. Therefore, it has no affiliation with **Pura Vida Divers** or any other Instructor Development Center. Only PADI Headquarter Instructor Examiners are involved.

Prerequisites: To qualify for the IE, a candidate must have successfully completed a PADI IDC within 12 months; must show proof of at least 100 logged open water scuba dives; and must have a PADI Diving Medical Statement signed by a physician (MD or DO) and dated within the previous 12 months

Instructor candidates must complete the following exams and perform the following skills:

Classroom

- Five-part theory exams on Physics, Physiology, Equipment, Skills & Environment and the PADI Recreational Dive Planner (tables & eRDPml versions) – multiple choice, true/false, 12 questions on each topic exam.
- PADI Systems, Standards & Procedures exam – multiple choice, open book, 50 question exam.
- Perform and pass one Knowledge Development Prescriptive Teaching Presentation.

Pool

- Demonstrate a 5 skills circuit as detailed by the Examiners.
- Perform and pass one Confined Water Teaching Presentation.

Open Water

- Perform an Unconscious Diver at the Surface rescue to demonstration quality.
- Perform one Open Water Teaching Presentation with 2 skills combined.

The Instructor Candidate must successfully complete all components of the PADI IE in order to earn the PADI Open Water Scuba Instructor (OWSI) certification. As an OWSI, one is qualified to teach various experience programs, the Open Water, Advanced Open Water, Rescue and Divemaster courses in addition to the Peak Performance Buoyancy and Project Aware specialty courses. Candidates are allowed to retake the IE if they do not pass the first time attempt with additional payments to PADI required.

DFAPRO-301: Diving First Aid for Professional Divers Instructor

20.0 Clock Hours

Diving First Aid for Professional Divers Instructor (DFAPRO) – The remote location of many dive sites, whether a few hours from shore or days from civilization, requires more advanced care than that offered by traditional rescue training. In addition, dive leaders need to know how to deal with minor marine life injuries, a subject rarely addressed in traditional first aid courses. To respond to this need for practical knowledge the Diving First Aid for Professional Divers program was developed. Underwater Naturalist Instructor: Divers enjoy their dives much more if they know what they are looking at. Teach your divers to identify the fish, creatures and coral species commonly seen.

Basic Seamanship and Emergency Action Procedures: Candidates gain confidence in managing a rescue as they work alongside **Pura Vida Divers** crew practicing real-time rescues in the ocean.

Fill Station Operations: Fill station operators are the primary line of defense in preventing unsafe cylinders returning to service. Students learn to fulfill this role by gaining the following knowledge and skills:

PSI Visual Cylinder Inspector: The PSI Visual Inspector Course is conducted over one day and covers a wide variety of topics that will help identify problems developing in cylinders before they become an explosive danger. Students receive hands-on training that qualifies them to technically and visually inspect cylinders for damage and defects during the interval between hydrostatic re-tests.

PSI Eddy Current Technician: Eddy Current testing is a powerful tool. This course provides Visual Cylinder Inspectors with the added training to know when and how to conduct proper Eddy Current Tests of SCUBA and SCBA cylinders in addition to hands-on experience with Eddy Current devices.

PSI Valve Repair Technician: This course provides a broad overview of valve types, valve repair and valve care. Students will gain experience by servicing multiple valves and in turn be prepared to service more than just the cylinder.

PSI Oxygen Cylinder Cleaning Technician: Cylinders and valves intended for Enriched Air Nitrox (EANx) service require special cleaning and inspection procedures. This course addresses the handling, inspection and cleaning of EANx cylinders.

Compressor Theory and Operations: Resort operators value employees who can properly maintain and operate these expensive and vital systems. **Pura Vida Divers** houses one of the most advanced fill stations in South Florida allowing DRS students an opportunity to learn from a State of the Art system. The advanced air-system knowledge and skills acquired during Resort Operations includes:

- An overview of compressor and filtration function
- Air fill station design and operation
- Checking and changing lubricants and filters
- Power start up procedures
- Cylinder filling procedures

DSAT Gas Blender: The Diving Science and Technology (DSAT) Gas Blender course will instruct the diver to completely mix and blend Nitrox cylinders using formulas and computer-based methods currently available. The course is divided into knowledge development and practical application sections. The knowledge and skills acquired will include:

- Oxygen; use and risks
- Helium blending theory
- Use of oxygen compatible air
- Gas blending Methods
- Nitrox blending

Resort Operations: Once you've completed the previous sections, you get to put your new skill set into practice by crewing, assisting with real classes and facilitating dive store operations. Students interact with actual customers while gaining invaluable experiences in all aspects of Dive Resort operations.

NOTE: Students do NOT take the place of paid crewmembers, staff or instructors. Student learning is conducted working under staff supervision at all times.

Prerequisites: Applicant must be certified as an Open Water Scuba Instructor, EFR Instructor (or equivalent), and DAN Oxygen Provider (current within 24 months). Additionally, for each Specialty except Equipment Specialist, the applicant must be able to show proof of at least 10

logged dives in each specialty diving area prior to submitting his/her Specialty Instructor application to PADI. This requirement may be met after the Resort Operations program.

Minimum Age: 18 years of age.

Required Equipment: pocket mask, two surface signaling devices (one audible – marine radio, whistle, air horn, etc. and one visible - delayed surface marker buoy (DSMB), signal mirror, flare, etc.), dive gloves, underwater slate with pencil

Recommended Equipment: Primary dive light, secondary dive light, lift bag with rope, wreck reel with line, 30 cuft stage cylinder with first stage, one – second stage and submersible pressure gauge

Note: Scuba tanks will be provided at no extra charge. Weight belts and weights will also be provided at no charge; however, a deposit of \$50 is required to cover possible loss.
