INTRODUCTION TO: **Pura Vida Divers, LLC**

FACILITIES

Pura Vida Divers School is located on Singer Island, the barrier island just north of Palm Beach, in Florida's Palm Beach County. Because the rich currents of the Gulf Stream come closest to Florida right here in Palm Beach County bringing amazing schools of fish and large animals, we firmly believe this area hosts the best diving in Florida! We host a full retail center, fill station and training center on site.

Since the most important aspect of diver training takes place in the open water, **Pura Vida Divers, LLC** is fortunate to be located one block from the warm, clear waters of the Atlantic Ocean. We plan for all of your open water training to be conducted in these pristine dive conditions from either the shore or from the dive boat. Confined water activities are conducted either in a nearby pool or in confined open water from the shore. We do utilize Broward Community College's Tigertail Lake occasionally for training scenarios. This is the same lake utilized by PADI for the Instructor Exams held in Ft Lauderdale.

Our facility has two classrooms, a small classroom (18.5 ft. x 10.5 ft.) for private sessions, and a larger classroom (19.5 ft. x 18.5 ft.) for group training. We also provide high speed wireless internet at the school and a computer that is available for students to access their personal email. Our Administrative Offices are on-site.

Pura Vida Divers, LLC is licensed to conduct Scuba Instructor Training by the Commission for Independent Education, in the State of Florida, and by PADI Americas.

COURSE DIRECTORS & INSTRUCTORS

Our Course Director, Jillian Blakkan-Strauss mentored under Barbara DeClerque and now coordinates and conducts many of our Professional Level Courses.

Our Course Director, David Wilemon, is a Veteran of the US Marine Corps and teaches many components of our Professional Level Courses.

Our Technical Instructor, Justin Newton, is a highly experienced Tech diver and coordinates all of our Technical diving courses.

Our diverse team of highly qualified Instructors are available to teach all additional aspects of our Career Programs with the exception of Instructor level courses, which the Course Directors conduct.

ADMINISTRATIVE INFORMATION

PERFORMANCE REQUIREMENTS AND GRADING

Skills, Academics, Confined and Open Water presentations will be graded as follows:

5, Excellent; 4, Good; 3, Average; 2 Below Average; 1, Unacceptable.

For PADI Courses: The passing grade on all written tests is 75% or higher. Anything below 75% would be considered failing. Exception: For PADI Enriched Air and PADI Technical Courses, a passing grade on all written tests is 80% or higher. Anything below 80% in these courses would be considered failing. PADI Courses are performance based and students will be expected to repeat assignments until acceptable grades are achieved. In order to attain certification at any level, students must demonstrate mastery of all performance requirements specified for a particular course. Participation in a Course does not guarantee certification. Upon successful completion of our Career Programs, candidates will be issued a Certificate of Completion for the corresponding program.

Candidates are also required to score at least 3.4 or higher on at least two academic presentations and 3.4 or higher on one open water presentation and two confined open water presentations during the IDC. Upon successful completion of the IDC, students will receive an IDC School Diploma called a "Certificate of Completion" from **Pura Vida Divers**. This Diploma qualifies the Student to attend an Instructor Exam. In the unlikely event a student cannot achieve acceptable grades, they will have the opportunity to repeat all or part of the course in the next program offered. In the event a student does not pass the Instructor Examination conducted by PADI, they may try again at a future date for an additional fee.

COUNSELING

Students receive continual input and critique on their performance during the programs. Candidates receive private counseling sessions throughout the IDC. These sessions are conducted by the Course Director and are designed to discover any concerns that a student may have whether academic or procedural.

STUDENT CONCERNS AND GRIEVANCES

Our Professional Training programs follow strict academic standards set forth by PADI. Students will be given several opportunities to meet these standards and obtain the required scores. In the unusual event that a student is unable to complete the course in the set time provided, they will be unable to attend the next course scheduled including the Instructor Exam; however, they will have the opportunity to repeat all or part of the course in the next program offered. Any academic complaints should be directed to the Course Director. Any administrative complaints should be directed to the President. The issues will be reviewed and a response given within 24 hours. If the student is not satisfied with the results after exhausting the institution's policy, the student may contact the Commission for Independent Education using the contact information found on the cover of this catalog.

ATTENDANCE POLICY

Professional SCUBA training is by nature very condensed. For this reason, unexcused absences will not be allowed and will be considered grounds for dismissal. Absences due to illness or emergencies must be approved by the Course Director. All training missed due to excused absences must be completed prior to the issuance of any certificate. The student will be charged at a rate of \$40 per contact hour (above and beyond the regular tuition) for all such makeup work if the makeup is conducted in special sessions rather than in subsequent classes. Tardiness will be considered a serious breach of rules. Therefore, lateness on more than two occasions will result in a formal warning; lateness on the third occasion will result in dismissal. Students are expected to complete all assigned reading, knowledge reviews, assigned video viewing and digital work prior to each in-person session. Repeated failure to complete assigned work prior to class will be considered grounds for dismissal. Students dismissed or failing to meet certification requirements due to unsatisfactory performance will be required to repeat the appropriate course in its entirety. If extended absences result in failure to complete certification requirements in the allotted time, provisions for completion may be made with the Course Director.

CONDUCT

All students are expected to conduct themselves in a professional manner at all times. Students will be subject to immediate dismissal for the following:

1. Possession or consumption of alcohol or narcotics during training, including the use of medicinal marijuana. Students may not be under the influence during any portion of their training.
2. Abusiveness towards other students or staff including but not limited to sexual harassment and inappropriate advances.
3. Violations of local, state or federal laws.
4. Damage to school premises or property or theft.
5. Gross violation of safe diving practices.

ACADEMIC AND DISCIPLINARY ACTIONS

If a student believes their academic scores are incorrect they can request an evaluation by another staff member. However, due to PADI's strict standards, a Course Director and IDC Staff members have the final say in students' scores. In the unlikely event that a student violates one or more of the actions listed under "CONDUCT" they are subject to dismissal from the school. If they believe they have been judged erroneously they are entitled to a counseling session with the President and a Course Director. The President will have the final say in these matters. Any violations of local, state or federal laws will be reported to the authorities.

HOUSING

Pura Vida Divers does not provide housing for students, but we will be happy to assist students with accommodation suggestions. Contact us for a list of local available housing options or visit our website.

PLACEMENT ASSISTANCE

If requested by the Student, placement assistance is available at no additional charge; however, the School cannot guarantee employment.

STUDENT RECORDS

Student records will be kept indefinitely. Students will have access to these records upon request.

POLICY STATEMENT

The school does not discriminate on the basis of race, sex or age. We will attempt to accommodate students with disabilities; however, a student must demonstrate the required performance requirements and provide a completed Medical Statement Form (signed by a physician). All applicants to **Pura Vida Divers, LLC** professional level training programs must be at least 18 years of age by the starting date of their course.

DEPOSITS & METHOD OF PAYMENT

Acceptable forms of payment include: MC, Visa, AMEX, Discover, or cash. *We do not accept personal checks.* The DEPOSIT is due at the time of signing the Enrollment Agreement and the BALANCE OF TUITION is required prior to attending the first class. All funds are payable in U.S. dollars. The school does not offer financial aid at this time.

REQUIRED GEAR

Required Equipment: Found within each Program Description

Note: Scuba tanks, weights and weightbelts will be provided at no extra charge. We do require a deposit to cover possible loss.

COURSE DATES & DAILY SCHEDULE

The enrollment dates are sent upon registration for the course and enrollment is on-going throughout the calendar year. The specific schedule for all courses will be dependent on factors such as weather and logistical considerations. Schedules are subject to change without notice due to weather conditions. Students should arrive for their programs assuming full days of activities and should avoid conflicting plans or commitments during the effective dates of their program. The schedule is typically Sunday through Monday from 8am to 6pm.

REFUND POLICY

Should a Student/applicant cancel his/her enrollment or be terminated by the School for any reason, all refunds will be made according to the following schedule:

1. Cancellation must be made in writing: by electronic mail, by Certified Mail or by termination.
2. All monies will be refunded if the School does not accept the applicant or if the Student cancels within three (3) business days after signing the enrollment agreement and making initial payment. An applicant not requesting cancellation by the scheduled starting date will be considered a Student.
3. Cancellation after the third (3rd) business day, but before the first class, will result in a refund of all monies paid, with the exception of the deposit (not to exceed \$150.00) and any eLearning fees if applicable. The cost of any books purchased from **Pura Vida Divers** that the student may wish to return will be refunded providing they are unopened and can be resold as new. The books must be returned within three (3) days of signing the Enrollment Agreement in order to receive a full refund. **OPEN WATER PLUS, FAST TRACK & TECH 40 PLUS Students Only:** please be aware that once you are issued the equipment included with this program it cannot be returned. If you leave the program for any reason you will be financially responsible for the issued equipment at the equipment cost denoted with each program on pages 47-49.
4. Students voluntarily terminating and/or those dismissed by the School will receive a refund prorated on an hourly basis. However, there will be no refunds issued once more than 40% of the program is completed.
5. Termination Date: When calculating the refund due to the Student, the last date of actual attendance by the Student is used in the calculation unless earlier written notice was received.
6. Refunds will be made within 30 days of termination of the Student's enrollment or receipt of a Cancellation Notice from the Student.

CREDIT FOR PRIOR TRAINING

Credit for prior training will be assessed by the Course Director on an individual basis and granted if appropriate. Prior training is defined as successful completion of PADI courses within one year and verified by a PADI Course Director in current teaching status. Credits are defined in terms of hours and there is a max amount of 25% transferable.

TRANSFER OF CREDIT

Credit for prior training may only be transferred at the discretion of the accepting institution. It is the student's responsibility to check to see if prior training credit will be accepted by another institution. The definition of a unit of credit is as follows: "clock hour" means a period of 60 minutes with a minimum of 50 minutes of instruction in the presence of an instructor.

PADI OPEN WATER DIVER PLUS:

25.0 Clock Hours

The Pura Vida Divers Open Water Diver Plus program is a four-day course which provides the skills and knowledge necessary to become a safe, certified, recreational scuba diver. The course consists of two full days of classroom and pool work, followed by two half days of open water dives with an instructor.

Objective: The Open Water Diver Plus Program takes a non-certified diver and transforms them into a safe and confident certified scuba diver.

Entrance/Admission Requirements: 18 years old, PADI Diving Medical examination form signed by a physician (specifically an MD or DO) stating fitness to dive and dated within the previous 12 months. High School Diploma or GED not required.

Required Equipment: Fins, mask, snorkel, buoyancy control device (BCD) with tank mount or separate backpack and low pressure inflator, primary regulator and alternate air source, submersible pressure gauge, depth gauge, quick release weight system and weights, wetsuit, dive computer, delayed surface marker buoy (DSMB), time monitoring device, compass. *A Personal Introductory Equipment Package is included with tuition.*

FAST TRACK

251.0 Clock Hours

Pura Vida Divers Fast Track Program takes an Open Water Diver through PADI Divemaster keeping in mind PADI's requirements for time and number of dives. This program can be entered with an Open Water certification.

Objective: The objective of the Fast Track Program is to take the novice diver and assist them on their path to becoming a PADI dive professional able to work in the scuba industry.

Entrance/Admission Requirements: 18 years old, PADI Open Water Diver or PADI recognized equivalent, PADI Diving Medical examination form signed by a physician (specifically an MD or DO) stating fitness to dive and dated within the previous 12 months. High School Diploma or GED not required. DAN Dive Accident Insurance required.

Required Equipment: Fins, mask, snorkel, buoyancy control device (BCD) with tank mount or separate backpack and low pressure inflator, primary regulator and alternate air source, submersible pressure gauge, depth gauge, quick release weight system and weights, wetsuit, whistle, dive computer, delayed surface marker buoy (DSMB), time monitoring device, RDP (eRDPml and Table), compass, dive knife/cutting tool, oronasal resuscitation mask. *A Professional Level Equipment Package is included with tuition.*

DIVE PROFESSIONAL CAREER LEVEL 1: DIVEMASTER 144.0 Clock Hours

The Dive Professional Career Level 1: Divemaster Program is the first Level of **Pura Vida Divers** Career Development Programs. The program encompasses all courses required to enter a PADI Instructor Development Course (IDC), plus highly recommended career enhancement courses. This Level can be entered at any point once meeting the entry requirements. Advanced Open Water Certification is required.

Objective: The objective of **Pura Vida Divers** Dive Professional Career Level 1: Divemaster Program is to take the experienced recreational diver and elevate their certifications and diving skills to the professional level which culminates with a PADI Divemaster certification. This program prepares candidates to take the next step, which is Dive Professional Career Level 2: Open Water Scuba Instructor.

Entrance/Admission Requirements: 18 years old, PADI Advanced Open Water Diver or PADI recognized equivalent and completed PADI EFR Primary and Secondary Care training within the last 24 months or PADI recognized equivalent. 40 dives are required at minimum to start the Rescue and Divemaster components, 60 dives are required before you can be certified as a Divemaster, completion of Knowledge Reviews for Enriched Air, Diving Accident Insurance (DAN is recommended), PADI Diving Medical Examination form signed by a physician (specifically an MD or a DO) stating fitness to dive and dated within the previous 12 months. High School Diploma or GED not required.

Required Equipment: Fins, mask, snorkel, buoyancy control device (BCD) with tank mount or separate backpack and low pressure inflator, primary regulator and alternate air source, submersible pressure gauge, depth gauge, quick release weight system and weights, wetsuit, whistle, dive computer, RDP (eRDPmI and Table), delayed surface marker buoy (DSMB), time monitoring device, compass, dive knife/cutting tool, oronasal resuscitation mask.

DIVEMASTER COURSE

86.0 Clock Hours

The Divemaster Course includes training toward the first professional of Dive Professional in **Pura Vida Divers** Career Development Programs. It can be entered at any point upon meeting the entry requirements. Advanced Open Water Certification, Rescue Diver Certification, documentation of at least 40 logged dives, Enriched Air Certification, and current CPR/First Aid training are required to begin the program.

Objective: The objective of **Pura Vida Divers** Divemaster Course is to take the experienced recreational diver and transition them to the professional level through elevating their diving skills and techniques in the PADI Divemaster course. This course prepares candidates to take the next step, which is Dive Professional Career Level 2: Open Water Scuba Instructor.

Entrance/Admission Requirements: 18 years old, PADI Advanced Open Water Diver or PADI recognized equivalent, PADI Rescue Diver or PADI recognized equivalent, and completed PADI EFR Primary and Secondary Care training within the last 24 months or PADI recognized equivalent. Documentation of 40 logged dives are required at minimum to start the course; 60 dives are required before you can be certified as a Divemaster. Diving Accident Insurance is required (DAN is recommended). PADI Diving Medical Examination form signed by a physician (specifically an MD or a DO) stating fitness to dive and dated within the previous 12 months. High School Diploma or GED not required.

Required Equipment: Fins, mask, snorkel, buoyancy control device (BCD) with tank mount or separate backpack and low pressure inflator, primary regulator and alternate air source, submersible pressure gauge, depth gauge, quick release weight system and weights, wetsuit, whistle, dive computer, RDP (eRDPml and Table), delayed surface marker buoy (DSMB), time monitoring device, compass, dive knife/cutting tool, oronasal resuscitation mask.

DIVE PROFESSIONAL CAREER LEVEL 2: OPEN WATER SCUBA INSTRUCTOR 94.5 Clock Hours

Pura Vida Divers Dive Professional Career Level 2 is the Open Water Scuba Instructor course. This program begins with the PADI Instructor Development Course (IDC). This level also includes EFR/CFC Instructor and the PADI Instructor Examination.

Additionally, we offer optional Instructor Exam Theory Preparation Workshops available for those who would like additional instruction. This Career Level can be entered at any point provided the student meets the entry requirements. After successful completion of the PADI Instructor Exam (IE), PADI will award the candidate its Open Water Scuba Instructor certification.

Objective: The objective of **Pura Vida Divers** Dive Professional Career Level 2: Open Water Scuba Instructor is to take a certified Divemaster and elevate their certifications and diving skills to the PADI Instructor level. This program puts these candidates on a direct path to working in the diving industry as an Instructor.

Entrance/Admission Requirements: 18 years old, certified as PADI Advanced Open Water Diver, PADI Rescue Diver and PADI Divemaster or PADI recognized equivalents and completed PADI EFR Primary and Secondary Care training within the last 24 months or PADI recognized equivalent. Be a certified Open Water Diver for at least 6 months. Have a PADI Diving Medical Statement signed by a physician (MO or DO) and dated within the previous 12 months. Proof of 100 logged dives and showing experience in Deep, Night and Navigation. Have Diving Accident Insurance (Divers Alert Network Insurance is recommended). High School Diploma or GED not required.

Required Equipment: Fins, mask, snorkel, buoyancy control device (BCD) with tank mount or separate backpack and low pressure inflator, primary regulator and alternate air source, submersible pressure gauge, depth gauge, quick release weight system and weights, wetsuit, whistle, dive computer, RDP (eRDPm1 and Table), delayed surface marker buoy (DSMB) and reel, time monitoring device, compass, dive knife/cutting tool, underwater pencil, oronasal resuscitation mask.

Pura Vida Divers Master Scuba Diver Trainer Prep Program includes 5 PADI Specialty Instructor certifications. At the conclusion of this program the student will meet the qualifications to apply for MSDT once PADI's requirements are met.

Objective: **Pura Vida Divers** Master Scuba Diver Trainer Prep program was developed to expand the teaching opportunities for PADI Instructors. It provides additional teaching credentials that are sought after by potential employers, and increases the Instructors' employability.

Entrance/Admissions Requirements: 18 years of age; DAN Dive Accident Insurance, Active Status PADI Open Water Scuba Instructor or Assistant Instructor, or have attended a PADI IDC within the last 12 months. Certified as a PADI Enriched Air (Nitrox) diver or hold a qualifying certification. High School Diploma or GED not required.

Required Equipment: Fins, mask, snorkel, buoyancy control device (BCD) with tank mount or separate backpack and low pressure inflator, primary regulator and alternate air source, submersible pressure gauge, depth gauge, quick release weight system and weights, wetsuit, whistle, enriched air compatible dive computer, delayed surface marker buoy (DSMB) and reel, time monitoring device, compass, dive knife/cutting tool, slate with pencil, fish ID slate.

MSDT-301: PADI Master Scuba Diver Trainer Prep 34.5 Clock Hours

Master Scuba Diver Trainer Prep course is actually five PADI Specialty Instructor courses conducted in a fully integrated manner over four days. The MSDT course is designed to train instructors in how to organize market and conduct the following PADI Specialty Diver Courses:

DFA-301: Diving First Aid Instructor

20.0 Clock Hours

Diving First Aid Instructor (DFA) – The remote location of many dive sites, whether a few hours from shore or days from civilization, requires more advanced care than that offered by traditional rescue training. In addition, dive leaders need to know how to deal with minor marine life injuries, a subject rarely addressed in traditional first aid courses. To respond to this need for practical knowledge the Diving First Aid program was developed. DFA consists of information from the Emergency Oxygen for Scuba Diving Injuries and Basic Life Support courses, and also includes training in Neurological Assessment and First Aid for Hazardous Marine Life Injuries. It meets U.S. Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) guidelines for workplace CPR and first aid.

- Anatomy, physiology, blood borne pathogens

The Student understands this addendum agreement shall be a binding contract and no further modification or representation except as herein expressed by both parties will be recognized.

VETERANS TUITION POLICIES

Any covered individual is permitted to attend or participate in the course of education during the period beginning on the date on which the individual provides the school a certificate of eligibility for entitlement to education assistance under Chapters 31, 35, and 33.

For Post 9/11 GI Bill ® (CH 33) students and VA Vocational Rehabilitation and Employment (Ch 31) students, our tuition policy complies with 38 USC 3679 (e). Pura Vida Divers will not assess a financial or access penalty for Ch 31 and Ch 33 beneficiaries, for up to 90 days, following certification of enrollment to VA for payment.

However, to qualify for this provision, students may be required to:

- Produce the VA Certificate of Eligibility (COE) by the first day of class;
- Provide a written request to be certified
- Provide additional information needed to properly certify the enrollment as described in “Additional School Policies”.

VETERAN’S ATTENDANCE POLICY

Students are expected to attend all classes. Excused absences will be granted for extenuating circumstances only. Excused Absences must be substantiated by entries in students files.

Early departures, class cuts, tardiness, etc. for any portion of a class period will be counted as an unexcused absence.

Students exceeding 2 unexcused absences in an evaluation period will be terminated from their VA benefits for unsatisfactory attendance.

The student’s attendance record will be retained in the veteran’s file for USDVA and SAA audit purposes.

STANDARDS OF ACADEMIC PROGRESS FOR VA STUDENTS

Students receiving VA educational benefits must maintain a minimum cumulative grade point average (CGPA) of "C" (75%) each evaluation period (term, quarter, semester, evaluation period etc.).

A VA student whose CGPA falls below "C" (75%) at the end of any evaluation period (term, quarter, semester, evaluation period etc.) will be placed on academic probation for a maximum of two consecutive evaluation periods. If the VA student's CGPA is still below "C" (75%) at the end of the second consecutive term of probation, the student's VA educational benefits will be terminated.

A VA student terminated from VA educational benefits due to unsatisfactory progress may petition the school to be recertified after attaining a CGPA of C (75%)

VETERAN'S CREDIT FOR PREVIOUS EDUCATION OR TRAINING

Students must report all education and training. This is to include (1) a copy of the student's high school diploma, GED or college diploma, (2) transcripts from all prior higher education institutions attended, and (3) all Joint Services Transcripts. The school must evaluate and grant credit, if appropriate, with the training time shortened, the tuition reduced proportionately, and students notified.

VETERAN'S REFUND POLICY

The refund of the unused portion of tuition, fees, and other charges for veterans or eligible persons who fail to enter a course or withdraw or discontinue prior to completion will be made for all amounts paid which exceed the approximate pro rata portion of the total charges that the length of the completed portion of the course bears to the total length of the course. The proration will be determined on the ratio of the number of days or hours of instruction completed by the student to the total number of instructional days or hours in the course and must be pro rata to the very end.

Should a veteran be terminated from the program for unsatisfactory performance, attendance policy violation, or violation of the enrollment agreement, Veteran will be financially responsible for any balance due the school once the VA has calculated the Pro rata refund due back to them.

Should a veteran withdraw from the program for unforeseen circumstances (family death, global pandemic, reenlistment in the armed forces, etc), VA will contact the veteran to provide proof of reason for withdrawal. Upon VA approval, no additional fees shall be due the school.
